

The Government Must Address Poverty and Inequality.

-Or the NHS will always be in a mess!

Yet more evidence was released last month, showing the devastating effects of poverty and inequality on children born since 2010. Researchers writing in the European Journal of Public Health said data suggests that cuts to social security benefits and services are key to understanding the increase in babies being born smaller or earlier.

Dr David Walsh, a senior lecturer in health inequalities at the University of Glasgow, who led the study said

“Babies that are born from premature, and at low-birth-weight are themselves at considerable risk of a whole set of adverse outcomes in later, childhood and adulthood, so the effects will be felt for years to come.”




Colin Hampton Coordinator of DUWC commented on the findings

“Every public health professional in the country and internationally, will say that the biggest driver of both physical and mental ill health issues is poverty and inequality. The problems of underfunding the National Health Service are intrinsically related to this. The demands on health professionals will continue to soar and the costs to the NHS and wider economy will inevitably rise if government does not seriously reverse the moves towards greater inequality and poverty.


“DUWC have been putting forward this position for many years but politicians are fixed on short-term issues. The future generations will count the cost of our inaction.” Colin went on to say.

OFGEM PRICE HIKE

**10% RISE IN ENERGY
PRICES**



As of October 1st, Ofgem will hike its price cap from **£1568** to **£1717**. The 10% increase will plunge 400,000 more households into fuel poverty, bringing the total to six million homes. For older people who had previously received the Winter Fuel Payment, this equates to an increase of 131% on winter 2020/21. It will make some pensioners' real terms energy bills higher this winter than at any other time. Unite4Energy wants - Fair energy prices and energy justice, Energy for all, A worker led transition to a carbon neutral energy mix and an end to the forced imposition of pre payment meters.

The Northern Requiem was a light on the communities who were robbed of their livelihoods when the pits were closed. Jonathan the director said: “There was never any consideration as to what the people who worked there would do when everything changed. It was not just about the jobs – it was the fact that everything revolved around the pit.

“The idea of a requiem is that you’re praying for the soul of the departed. The ultimate goal of such things, if you’re of a Catholic bent, is the soul’s triumph over death. That’s how it works in the context of mining – everything died 40 years ago but it’s now looking hopefully to the future that things may get better.

Join our winter fuel campaign






